## PRESIDENT DONALD

Yes, miracles do happen. The wisest political experts in the land predicted it would take a miracle for Trump to ever be elected. Although he did not turn water into wine, this miracle is also likely to have wide spread consequences not only for this country but for the world. The pundits are now busy looking for excuses to justify their almost universal ignorance of what was happening to the electorate. This raises the question of how did he do it? There was a large segment of society in which people had legitimate concerns about the economy and their future. They felt abandoned, were angry and anxious. Psychoanalyst Eric Fromm in his book *Escape from Freedom* attempted to explain the rise of Nazism prior to world war II by postulating that when a people feel disenfranchised and anxious they look for a savior to which they are willing to cede power. Trump appeared to fit that role perfectly. He had convinced them he was the toughest guy on the playground, and he assured them he would vanquish those responsible for their angst in short order. He didn't need to say how he would do all that good stuff, nor did he need to for they were eager to give him full reign.

Psychiatrists use the term projection to describe the process in which people ascribe their own objectionable behaviors or thoughts to others. In that vein while Mr. Trump was talking about lying Ted, the fact checkers were working overtime to keep up with what his handlers would call "misstatements". There was also the moniker of crooked Hillary, but such a term surely must not apply to someone of Trump's stature. Of course the deliberate and conscious use of projection is a very useful tool to avoid responsibility for one's own actions since it keeps one's adversaries on the defensive.

Perhaps his greatest accomplishment was to convince his followers that he was a champion of the working man. This billionaire (or not) who was born into a life of privilege, and who has been shown to owe some of his success to stiffing the little guy seems an unlikely candidate for such a title.
